

Hempsted Church of England Primary School February 2024 Newsletter



Dear Parents/Carers, Governors and Friends of the School,

Welcome to the latest newsletter. There's plenty to tell you about, things that have happened and things that are planned. In fact, February and March are looking very busy with lots of great things to look forward to.

Changes in Staffing

As you may already know, Mrs Lucie Hill is leaving us at half-term. Mrs Hill has been a teacher at Hempsted for nearly 10 years and is well-known to the children as a great singer!! Over the years, she has arranged several iSing Pop concerts at the church, led the teaching of RE across the school and has been part of a governor's working party helping to ensure that the school fulfils it's role a Church of England school. We will very much miss her, and wish her the very best of luck in her new role as a senior children's pastor.

Moving forward, we believe that we have been very fortunate to recruit another great teacher to join the team at Hempsted. Mrs Laura Walters will be joining us from Dursley Church of England Primary Academy. The Senior Leadership Team, members of the Governing Body and the School Council interviewed for the role just before Christmas, and we are delighted that we can now announce Mrs Walters' appointment.

Attendance

The school attendance rate is currently 94.6% which is an improvement of 1.3% on this time last year and in-line with what we expect. We have had a LOT of illness in the past week or so affecting pupils and staff. Many are saying that they've never felt so ill, or have never seen their children so poorly. The main symptom has been a very high temperature, so high that it has been leading to nausea and sickness. People have also been saying that their whole body has been hurting. Please, if your child has a high temperature then please keep them off until their temperature has returned to normal for 24 hours. Do not dose them up with calpol and send them in!

Recently, we sent home your child's attendance data for the last term. If your child's attendance is less than 90%, the Department for Education classifies them as 'persistent absentees'. If this has been genuine illness there is very little that you can do about it, but it does reemphasise that if you take term-time holidays and then there is illness, you can very quickly find your child in the 'persistent absentee' category.

Residential Trips

We plan residential trips for children in Year 4 and Year 6. These are always fantastic experiences for the children, and for some of them, it is their first time away from home without their parents. In March, the Year 4 children go to The Wilderness Centre in the Forest of Dean for 3 days and 2 nights. In June, the Year 6 children go to PGL Osmington Bay in Weymouth for 4 days and 3 nights.

We always try to keep the costs of any trips down, but naturally residential trips cost more as we need to pay for accommodation, instructors, catering and transport. The accompanying staff are not paid extra despite being on constant supervision day and night!!

If you have a child in **Year 3** or **Year 5**, it might be worth you making a note of these trips and planning ahead. Currently, the Year 4 trip is costing $\pounds 200$ per child and the Year 6 trip is costing $\pounds 350$ per child.

Online Safety

I would like to include the same article that I shared last year as I believe it is of value to you:

"Online sites such as YouTube use algorithms (computer programming) to recommend videos to watch based on a user's viewing habits. These algorithms are an emerging safeguarding issue for our children. Research has shown that these algorithms can push children towards increasingly extreme content including groups linked with radicalisation, extremism and misogyny. In particular, the risk of younger children seeing inappropriate content is increased when they share an account with an older sibling.
